A String of Pearls: Mandarin Ducks, Butterflies, and Modern Shanghai in the 1920s (online premiere) (pre-record)

A String of Pearls (see pg.21) exemplifies the kind of "modern cinema" Shanghai filmmakers and intellectuals in the 1920s had aspired to achieve before the Japanese invasion of Manchuria in 1931. It is also one of few surviving films written by Hou Yao (1903–42), who was a pioneer in Chinese-language film theory and criticism. In this talk, Victor Fan will introduce the historical background and critical discourses of Shanghai cinema in relation to this masterpiece.

A riotous double bill featuring two women who delight in defying convention and turning the tables on the men who just don't measure up.

Cow-girl Ann (Fay Tincher) is Rowdy by name and rowdy by nature, so her father packs her off to college hoping she will "larn to be a lady". The tutors try to smooth Ann's "rough corners" but you can't keep a good woman down and it's not long before she is putting the men in their place. In our second film, Florence Turner plays widowed landlady Mrs Waters. One of her regulars fancies the easy life and hatches a dodgy plan to win a place in her heart (or rather a stake in her assets). But he has underestimated the indomitable Mrs W, who has a plan of her own.

The Loves of Mary Queen of Scots

Stand aside Saoirse... it's time to make way for the silent era's answer to the most celebrated and romantic figure in Scottish history: Mary Stuart.

After the cancellation of our 2020 Festival we are delighted at last to present the world premiere of a new restoration of this extremely rare British feature film, chronicling the Scottish Queen's life. Full of intrigue, betrayal and scandal: her bitter enmity with John Knox, wars with the unruly Scottish nobility, her fatal marriages to Darnley and Bothwell, her captivity, imprisonment and execution at the hands of Queen Elizabeth... all are played out in this ambitious historical costume drama.

A Movie World Tour: How 1930s Amateur Filmmaking Conquered the World


In the 1920s, interest in amateur filmmaking expanded rapidly across the globe thanks to affordable and widely available filmmaking equipment and materials. Although often dismissed, these DIY makers of "home movies" offered exciting alternatives to the predominant mainstream movie industry.

This talk will consider how the work of the 'serious' amateur filmmaker pioneers blossomed during this lively period, producing unorthodox and groundbreaking films to rival the mainstream with their imagination and creativity.

Around the world in seven films...

In 1935, during the formative years of amateur filmmaking in Britain, the Institute of Amateur Cinematographers (IAC) sent out a package of seven awardwinning films on a "World Tour". Arranged in conjunction with cine clubs across the globe (including Australia, India, and Japan), this tour represented the breadth of filmmaking styles and genres open to the amateur filmmaker.

To mark the 90th anniversary of the IAC, this specially curated programme features new 2k scans of the tour films, recently digitised at the East Anglian Film Archive and Filmoteca de Catalunya as part of the research project 'International Amateur Cinema Between the Wars, 1918-39'.

Journey to the Isles: Marjory Kennedy-Fraser

Thursday 17 March | 19:30 £14 | £11.50 conc

A mesmerising glimpse into the landscapes, folktales and songs that inspired one of Scotland's great early collectors of Traditional Arts.

Kennedy-Fraser began collecting Hebridean songs in 1905, fired by a desire to preserve and celebrate the musical riches of the islands' people. These disarming films, made by Kennedy-Fraser herself - provide a snapshot of her work and the culture of the people she devoted her life to studying. All the while revealing the warmth of her personality and the profundity of her passion for the rugged beauty of the Hebrides.

Joining us on this journey to the Isles will be acclaimed and charismatic live performer Marion Kenny - one of Scotland's leading storytellers; and award-winning musician, singer and songwriter: Mairi Campbell. Weaving together words, music and song alongside Kennedy-Fraser's enchanting films, Marion and Mairi will conjure the sounds and landscapes captured by this key figure of Scotland's Celtic Revival.

Ever since Donald Trump interrupted Hilary Clinton during a 2016 Presidential Debate, #NastyWomen has become a global feminist rallying cry. Yet, there is a long and robust history of women celebrating their own nastiness to speak truth to patriarchal power. Meet HippFest's very own Nasty Women in this new programme, co-curated by Maggie Hennefeld and Laura Horak.


For this fun-filled double-bill, our guest curators showcase two favourites about gender hijinks in the Wild West! Women wearing the trousers... and the cowboy boots to match! Our first Nasty Woman is Actor-Producer Texas Guinan - a successful Broadway star, who played heroic cowgirls in films throughout the 1910s, and here plays a self-sufficient ranch owner who reluctantly decides to enlist the help of a husband. Next meet hugely popular comedy actress Fay Tincher as cowgirl Ann... "Rowdy" by name and "rowdy" by nature. Tincher worked continuously from 1912 to 1928, appearing in more than 160 films, also running a production company of her own.

Wartime propaganda and peacetime diplomacy: Edith Cavell on Film 1915–1928

Friday 18 March | 13:30 £5 | £3.50 conc

An essential look at the compelling historical events and fictionalised narratives behind this afternoon's feature presentation *Dawn*.

When the German occupiers in Belgium shot Edith Cavell for treason in 1915 they handed the British and their allies a perfect propaganda opportunity to portray the enemy as brutal and uncivilized. After the war international relations shifted significantly, and cinema took a key role in cementing more friendly relations within Europe and in remembrance activities through battle reconstructions and war stories.

Lawrence Napper's accessible, illustrated talk will consider Herbert Wilcox's extraordinary retelling of Cavell's story in the film *Dawn* and discuss representations of the Cavell case on film as part of allied propaganda, shining a light on the diplomatic controversy sparked by continuing interest in the case.

Dawn

Friday 18 March | 16:00 £10 | £8 conc

One of the most controversial films of the 1920s *Dawn* tells the story of British nurse Edith Cavell, shot at dawn by the Germans on 12 October 1915 for helping over 200 Allied soldiers escape from German-occupied Belgium during WW1. Diplomatic efforts to minimise the film's perceived potential for inflaming anti-German sentiment and disrupting international relations led to censor cuts for British audiences but in Belgium the film was released intact. It is this uncensored version that we present for our stirring Festival screening.

Director Herbert Wilcox was keen to ensure realism and historical accuracy in his film, using original location footage, scrupulously researched set designs and one of Cavell's collaborators – Ada Bodart – playing herself. The lead role was given to prominent stage actress Sybil Thorndike, whose physical resemblance to Cavell and dignified performance add yet more weight to this suspenseful war drama.





Lydia Hayward and The Boatswain's Mate

Saturday 19 March | 12:45 £7 | £5 conc.

British screenwriter Lydia Hayward could spin comedy gold out of any story and wrote dozens of screenplays in the 1920s. She was hailed in the film trade press as "the finest scenario writer we have", but her fine reputation languishes forgotten with the films she worked on. Happily, HippFest is here to change that!

Join Bryony Dixon - curator of silent film at the BFI National Archive, and long-time champion of Lydia Hayward - for an enjoyable introduction to the screenwriter's creative career and outstanding contribution to some of the era's most widely enjoyed films.

This event includes a screening of the short comedy *The Boatswain's Mate* written by Lydia Hayward from the humorous story by W.W. Jacobs. Florence Turner (famed as the 'Vitagraph Girl' and one of the film industry's first stars) plays savvy pub landlady Mrs Waters, the ideal woman, according to lazy ex-boatswain George Benn, who fancies himself as a publican by proxy. Benn enlists a "mate", a burly out of work seaman, in an overcomplicated plan to appear heroic, in Mrs Waters' eyes. This doesn't quite go to plan.

Screenwriter Lydia Hayward shows off her sharp-eyed wit and expert ear for comic vernacular in this delightful romcom .

Handsome Hollywood leading-man Ian Hunter made his film debut here as Martin Bering - a feckless, disinherited toff, who falls for the charms of Annie Armstrong - the independent mistress of a Bloomsbury boarding house. The downwardly mobile Bering soon learns how the other half lives, and learns what is really valuable in life, under the reforming influence of kind-hearted Annie.

This well-plotted and entertaining film features a splendid cast of ensemble characters - Annie's roguish wee brother John who enlists Bering in his "Anti-Boarders League", the dubious Jim who is taken on as a rather unpolished butler, and the hilarious gaggle of lodgers who try Annie's patience with their gossiping and finickity ways.

The Fall of the House of Usher

Get ready to be haunted by this brooding and impressionistic adaptation of Edgar Allan Poe's creepy Gothic tale of obsession and madness.

An unnamed man pays a visit to the decaying, aristocratic mansion of his childhood friend, Roderick Usher. He finds Usher to be demented... obsessed by death, consumed with fear that his beloved wife Madeline will die, and no less fearful that she will be buried alive. He spends his days painting an eerily lifelike portrait of Madeline, but with each brush stroke the life seems to drain from her.

Epstein's version changes the relationship of Madeline and Roderick from brother and sister to husband and wife but matches the horror and menace of Poe's story, with weird, surreal images and an insidious atmosphere conveyed by the glowering halls, fluttering curtains and nightmarish suggestiveness of the veil and coffin.




